TDA invited Dukies to the School Land Rover with the School flag flying proudly, before and after the rugby match to enjoy drinks and snacks. The day was great, a fantastic chance for everyone to share stories and memories.

The Army won the Babcock Trophy

after beating the Royal Navy 22-14. Two early Jon Humphrey penalties gave the Navy the lead before Matavesi saw the red card for striking with the head. Three quick-fire first-half tries from Chris Leathem, Junior Bulumakau and Jamie Miller quickly handed Army the lead.

James Dixon converted a penalty at the start of the second half but Ratu Vakalutukali flew over for the Navv



to ensure a nervy end to the game.

The win is the Army's 62nd in the Army vs Navy game and means the Navy still has not won the Babcock Trophy since 2010.

Dukies Remember 100th Anniversary of Armistice

Westminster Abbey

Students and staff led by the School's Principal Alex Foreman took part in the Torch Lighting Ceremony of the British Torch of Remembrance at the Tomb of the Unknown Warrior in Westminster Abbey. This historic and significant event took place in the presence of His Excellency Rudolf Huygelen, Belgian Ambassador and Tobias Ellwood MP PC, Parliamentary Under Secretary of State at the Ministry of Defence.

In a service led by the Canon of Westminster Abbey, the Rev Anthony Ball, students formed a Guard of Honour to stand over the Tomb of the Unknown Warrior during the service, as well as a Colour party and buglers. Senior Under Officer Lewis commanded the Guard of Honour, which consisted of Junior Under Officers

Megan, Sam, Ammo, Holly, Saskia and Tammy. The Colour Ensigns were Junior Under Officers
Charlotte and Fiona. Junior Under Officer Georgina and Bugle Major Valen played the Last Post and Reveille. Also, American exchange students were privileged to attend.

The contribution of these students was overseen by School staff members Lieutenant Colonel Steven Saunderson, Regimental Sergeant Major Steff Dowle, Major David Cresswell and Major Andrew Nunn

Tobias Ellwood served in the Royal Green Jackets and reached the rank of Captain; he is currently an Army Reserve Colonel. Mr Ellwood was also the MP who bravely tried to save PC Keith Palmer's life after he was fatally stabbed by the Westminster terrorist in 2017.







Scarlet Poppies - The Remembrance Concert



There wasn't a dry eye in the house following the beautifully performed and emotional 'Scarlet Poppies'. The concert was the suggestion of Dukie Allan Mayo, following a meeting of TDA. The inspirational cultural event provided students with cross-curricular elements such as Wartime poems, dance and drama.

Dover Service at National Cruise Terminal Memoria



A School Guard of Honour and buglers attended the Service of Remembrance at Dover Marine Railway Station (now the cruise terminal) in support of the British Torch of Remembrance and South Eastern Railways, as the torch continued its journey to Ostend, Roeselare, Bredene, Ypres and Brussels.

During the Great War, Dover played a large part in defending the nation and as a port ferrying troops to the Continent. This made the service for the WWI 100th anniversary all the more poignant, and the town's civic dignitaries along with some 70 members of the public stood alongside our students and staff to pay their respects.

National Memorial Arboretum

It was reported more than over 10,000 military and members of the public attended the service held at the base of The Armed Forces Memorial in dry but chilly conditions at the National Memorial Arboretum. Following the service, His Royal Highness The Duke of Gloucester took the salute at the march-past.





Dukies including Peter Godwin and Robert Cross, proceeded to the School memorial where the five wooden crosses which were laid during the 'Service of Remembrance' on 16 September 2018, for those Dukies known to have been killed in service since 1945, were still displayed.

The Dukies' Foundation (TDF) is the School's registered charity having made grants of £725,000 to the School since it began.

Charity fundraiser, TDF trustee and Vice Chair of The Dukies' Association, Chris Crowcroft (1963 - 70, Haig & Clive) has succeeded Alan Jones as TDF Chair. The Dukies' Foundation would like to give a large thank-you to Alan Jones, who provided TDF with five years of excellent service.

Recent grants have continued towards the TDF's goal of enhancing the lives of the Dukies of today, such as providing funding towards a School trip to CERN Hadron Collider in Geneva next spring (assisted by a donation from Dukie Don Birch). TDF is currently receiving funds towards 'Action for Physics', an event in London, for which funding is being matched by Dukie Adrian Nunn. Over Remembrance Weekend, TDF co-funded with Dukie Allan Mayo, the remarkable 'Scarlet Poppies' concert. TDF is also helping to fund the Dukies expedition to the Chennai & Gats region of India in 2019 to build new facilities for disabled children. The School's Wellbeing Workshops have also been aided by TDF, to provide counselling for students. To date, TDF has been able to award nine student bursary awards to enable students to stay at the School.

War Memorial Campaign



The war memorial was cleaned before Remembrance Sunday, thanks to donations.

On 17 October 2018, TDF launched the Dukies war memorial challenge. This idea of Peter Vincent (1958 - 68, Haig & Wolfe) and Paul Harrington (1957 - 67, Haig, Roberts & Clive), aimed to raise £10,000 for a full restoration of the war memorial.

Less than a month later, the TDF reached its target and the full restoration of our war memorial is to be scheduled when the good weather returns in spring / summer 2019. The war memorial surfaces will be cleaned and smoothed, the inscriptions re-carved and repainted, and the bronze sword will be professionally cleaned and restored by a bronze expert.

The School and TDF would like to say a huge thank-you to all those who kindly and generously donated to our war memorial restoration campaign.

Your Stories DOYRMS Swagger Stick

Porl 'Stan' Stephenson (1978 - 85, Kitchener & Roberts) recently donated an original Georgian Malacca DOYRMS swagger stick to the School's archive collection.

Porl, in his own words, "had too much time on [his] hands one day, and was plodding around a well known auction site" when he came across this Georgian Malacca Swagger Stick with the Duke of York's Royal Military School crest. His "fingers were crossed" as he "weighed in to start a bidding war", which he won.

Porl thought it was appropriate to return the swagger stick to the

School, where it would have originally been used after the School's move from London to Dover.

Now the swagger stick is at the School, RSM Steff Dowle is currently deciding on an official use, whether it should be a part of the School's museum or possibly as an award for military achievement, such as being presented to the Head Stick Orderly each year.

The School would like to thank Porl for generously purchasing this swagger stick and donating it to the School.





1908 Royal Visit Souvenir

The School was contacted by an executor for a lady who had recently passed away. Within her possessions was a souvenir of the Royal Family visiting the Duke of York's Royal Military School in 1908. The souvenir is printed on crepe paper and is believed to have been produced at the time to commemorate the visit. The souvenir has now been added to the School archive collection.

Walking Home for Christmas

The School took part in the 'Walking Home for Christmas' campaign, raising money for Help for Heroes and Walking With the Wounded - the charities co-founder Simon Daglish is a former Chief School Prefect and currently Chair of The Dukies' Association.

The School never seriously considered asking all students to walk home for Christmas at the end of term (some of them do live rather a long way away from Dover), but plans to challenge all students (and staff) to 'Walk a mile for Christmas' soon came to fruition. Four laps – 1,600 metres – of our state-of-the-art athletics track seemed to fit the bill.

With an aim to raise £10 per student and staff, we aimed to raise £5,000 in a little over a week. To achieve this, we would need to raise more money for a single charity event than any other in DOYRMS memory.

Sunday December 2 ,dawned grey, murky, and with squally showers. Did this deter the Dukies... Certainly not! Students, in a variety of attire from onesies to fancy dress, all proudly sported their special 'WWTW' Santa hats and walked the mile.

Since then, the Dukie family of students, staff, alumni and parents have raised a staggering £5,813 to date!

White Rose Academy - Hockey Report

The White Rose Academy (WRA) has been set-up to support sports development at the School, and the project has seen significant investment in hockey this term. The students have been fortunate with the support they have been given through TDF; and in short time, a great deal has been achieved. The most able students, about 90 boys and 90 girls have received an extra hour's coaching a week and travelled to watch premier league hockey. The 1st teams now have new high quality hockey sticks for matches, and the girls received a coaching clinic from Grace Balsdon (current GB player).

Each academy player will receive an academy hoodie, and new team strips have been bought. Also, awards have been presented at the sports assembly for students who have shown the greatest commitment to the academy. Despite its infancy, the WRA is already having a significant impact on the performance of our students. This was highlighted by the progression our girls 1st team hockey made over the course of the season. In their penultimate match,

the students beat Deal hockey club 1-0, having lost to them twice 3-0 earlier in the season. In their final match, the girls beat Kent College Pembury 3-0, having lost to the same school 7-1 at the end of last season.

On November 29, the 1st XI girls hockey team took on the staff, in a match supported by the WRA. It was a close fought encounter, with the girls taking the lead. The staff fought back and pipping the girls 3 – 2. Staff and students then enjoyed a fantastic meal at the local Indian restaurant, where Paul Harrington (co-founder of the WRA), presented a stick to the player of the match and a pair of AstroTurf trainers to the runner-up.

Looking ahead, it will be excited to the boys' progress, having had the extra training through the WRA in the first term. The TDA is keen to test the boys with a fixture on March 15 starting at 6pm; a new TDA playing strip is being bought for the match. 




School News continued International Day

Obituary's

Douglas McKenzie 27/01/1959 - 03/11/2017

(1970 - 77, Wolfe)

Douglas went straight to Sandhurst from the School, being commissioned into the RCT in 1980. He served in Germany, N. Ireland and England, before leaving the Army as a Captain in 1989. During his Army career he qualified as a Civil Engineer at the Royal Military College of Science, later being employed by Thomas Telford in London. Douglas was a keen free-fall parachutist, completing almost 1,000 jumps. He was also a qualified glider pilot and SCUBA diver.

John Crisford CBE 06/12/1940 - 2018

(1950 - 56, Kitchener)



John joined The Duke of York's Royal Military School in 1950 at the age of 10 where among other things, he learnt to play the euphonium. In 1959, he joined The Royal Horse Guards (Blues) band and a year later he joined The Royal Military School of Music, Knellar Hall. Here he was awarded the Professors prize for "Best All Round Pupil" and "Worshipful Company Bronze medal". His name appears on the honours board in the Band Practice Room to this day.

John married Jean on 31 March 1967 and they had two girls, Alexa and Andrea in 1968 and 1971 respectively. They were married for 51 years until his unexpected death on 2 May 2018.

During 1967, John joined the REME band, Arborfield, where he stayed for two years before finally joining the RAPC where he remained for the rest of his army life. His career in the army spanned 22 years whereby he served in the UK, Germany, Norway and Kuwait (where he was on loan to the Kuwait Armed Forces). He also did two tours in Northern Ireland during The Troubles. He left the army in 1981 and worked for local government for several years and thereafter for a nationwide flooring company before finally moving to Hunstanton in 1997 (a part of the county John and Jean both adored), where he worked as a postman until his retirement in 2005.

John loved the game of rugby union and qualified as a referee for Notts, Lincs and Derby and later as a National Touch Judge for top class clubs. He was also an avid Oxford United football supporter and attended the game on Saturday 28 April when they beat Rochdale 2-1 at home and secured their place in league one for the next season

Shortly after moving to Hunstanton, he set up the Hunstanton Concert band as although Hunstanton had a band stand, they didn't have a permanent band. He also served as a councillor on Hunstanton Town Council.

John commenced studies for an Open University degree in 1981 and was awarded Bachelor of Science (Hons) in 2006. While he had retired in 2005 from paid work, he probably became busier than ever when he sought voluntary work with the Royal British Legion having been a member for many years. He was elected onto the Board of Trustees, became the National Vice Chairman and finally the National Chairman in 2013. During this time he led the biggest change programme that The Legion had ever experienced, and with his Chief Executive, left the charity fit to face the 21st Century. His drive in working for The Legion was due to the help that they had given his father following his treatment as a prisoner of war during the Second World War.

In June 2016, he was awarded the CBE in the Queen's birthday honours list for "Voluntary service to ex-servicemen and women". Recently he had joined the Fakenham Town Band, and the International Military Musical Society as well as supporting the Household Cavalry Memorial Guard.

A lovely man who adored his wife and two daughters, John will be sorely missed by so many people. Gone but never forgotten.

Alexander Beaumont 03/04/1947 - 24/04/2018

(1958 - 64, Wolfe)



Alexander Beaumont sadly passed away after suffering a heart attack on 24 April 2018.

Alex was a member of the school 1st XV and kept goal for the hockey 1st XI as well as being an accomplished athlete specialising in discus and shot.

Like many of his generation, he worked on the cross-Channel ferries in the summer, but then chose to stay on and make the merchant navy his first career. He worked on several cruise ships and bar-tending was his speciality.

In 1974, he finally settled in Sydney Australia and in 1977 put his bar-tending skills to good use by opening his own bar school. This became an extremely successful enterprise and Alex ran a chain of schools for most of his life. His schools provided staff for many of the country's top hotels. He developed the skill of 'flaring' (juggling bottles and glasses like Tom Cruise in "Cocktail") and at one time was the flaring champion as well as cocktail mixing champion of Australia. Alex went on to be the President of the Australian Bar-Tenders Guild and eventually of the International Bar-Tending Association. He worked as a consultant to many hotels and clubs, and trained and supplied staff for many shipping lines.

He travelled extensively lecturing on bar-tending and authored the best-selling "101 cocktails". He was hugely respected and liked by everyone who knew him and was famed for his wit and for his loud booming voice.

Alex leaves four daughters by two marriages. He was proud to be the father of two NSW basketball players, Natalia and Tatania. Alex's funeral in Penrith, NSW was attended by two old Dukies, Jay Nicholson and lifelong friend, Bob Ashford. Bob delivered a splendid eulogy which touched on Alex's time at the School and in Dover.

Peter Goble 25/07/1937 - 23/11/2018

(1947 - 52)

Peter joined the Duke of York's Royal Military School in 1947 after the loss of his father in wartime.

After leaving DOYRMS in 1952, Peter became an army apprentice at Arbourfield later joining the Royal Army Medical Corps where he rose to Warrant Officer Class 1. He made a second career in hospital management in Harrogate. In retirement, Peter specialised in military research, including into DOYRMS and also became a skilled wood carver. Peter was father to Jason and lived in Yorkshire where he cared for his wife Valerie who sadly died previously this year.

Peter was an unsung but devoted Dukie who gave much back to DOYRMS, in respect of the School's history through his research and to other initiatives like The Army Children's Archive. He was also a founding member of the Clocktower Society which will record his name in perpetuity.

Angus Macpherson 21/08/1973 - 22/12/2018

(1984 - 91, Haig & Wolseley)



Angus will always be remembered by those who knew him as a man of courage, kindness, generosity of spirit, and responsibility. Responsibility which made him both Prefect and Head Chorister in his time at School. His sense of courage and endeavour led him to learn many things after leaving School,

including skiing, parachuting, skydiving and hand gliding. He also took piloting lessons for both microlight and helicopter. After graduating in Computing from York University, Angus went on to enjoy many successful years as a consultant for Deloitte, followed by more successful years self-employed. He is survived by his loving wife Richeldis, daughter Rosie and son Cullen.
